Introducing Amphibians!



Amphibians are finally bere! Our animal groups are now complete: enjoy arthropods, amphibians, reptiles, birds, and mammals in the game.



On the Five Animal Groups

Have you noticed that there are certain design themes among arthropod, amphibian, reptile, and mammal cards? Just as the animals within these groups share similarities due to their close genetic relationships, cards in each of the five clades possess similar strengths and weaknesses that are useful to keep in mind as you craft your deck.

Arthropods are perhaps the most straightforward species cards to play. They typically benefit from special habitat resources and can remain in place quietly earning population counters while your flashier animals distract your opponent.

Mammals are more generalists and offer large powerful predators for you to make use of.



Birds are often highly social and interactive. Bird cards, correspondingly, are about synergies. Use them to make powerful combinations with other cards.

Reptiles are a more defensive group, built to deter your opponent or survive adverse conditions.

Amphibians are sensitive to environmental conditions, so your amphibian cards care about changes to their habitats.

Unseen Diversity

The trail cameras at Asombro's Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park reveal the true and surprising variety of animals that can be found in this particularly dry corner of the Chihuahuan Desert. Many of these species are not commonly seen for just this reason - due to the harsh conditions, many desert animals must wait until favorable conditions arrive before they venture out. This may involve spending the better part of the year in a dormant state (e.g. toads, box turtles, and many insect eggs & pupae), or may simply mean that they only come out at night to avoid the parching daytime temperatures. Take a look at some of the awesome nocturnal park residents that Asombro has documented, and make sure to come to their evening event on October 11th to grab trading cards featuring a few of these photos!
