# The Super Heroes Behind Asombro's Success

About 35 years ago, a group of like-minded people organized themselves with the goal of creating a place for the people of Las Cruces to celebrate and learn about the desert. The group that then called itself the Las Cruces Nature Park donated their time and energy to teaching, fundraising, and all the administrative tasks that are required to start an organization. They found others who shared their vision and built a volunteer corps. The first decade of the organization's existence was entirely volunteer driven. When they did have the means to hire someone, that person knew to leverage all the knowledge and dedication of the volunteers into growth. For three and a half decades, volunteers have remained crucial to Asombro's success.

Asombro's most visible volunteers are those that join our staff as educators in the classrooms, on field trips, and at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park (CDNP). These brave souls are ready for anything, from the most challenging student questions (like "Why?") to teaching in dust and wind! By allowing our staff to connect with more students in one day, these volunteers help us reach more than 20,000 students each year.

At the CDNP, our Friends group gathers several Saturdays a year to maintain our trails and facilities. They trim plants, repair erosion, pick up litter, and support our park manager in keeping tabs on over 900 acres.

These days, our volunteers donate approximately 1200 hours each year to make Asombro a success. By teaching alongside staff, maintaining trails, working behind the scenes, serving as our leaders on the Board of Directors and more, these amazing people enable Asombro to offer more opportunities for learning, and more memorable and meaningful interactions with students of all ages.
