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## Students Get Creative in 13<sup>th</sup> Desert Data Jam

When you see a diorama showing data on leaf litter decomposition or hear a rap song presenting data comparing the grazing time of two types of cows in the desert, you know it must be Desert Data Jam time!

Asombro's 13<sup>th</sup> annual Desert Data Jam wrapped up on April 24, 2025. This unique competition that was created by Asombro has now been replicated by other education groups for students in Puerto Rico, New York, Massachusetts, and beyond!

The heart of the Desert Data Jam is data interpretation and communication. 7<sup>th</sup> grade students choose from four datasets collected near Las Cruces. They learn about the study design, pore over the data, and identify a pattern. Then their creativity is put to the test as they design and present a creative project that shows the data trend to scientists and non-scientists.


This year's data jam featured creative projects like a papier-mâché coyote, poems, crocheted cows, video games, a welded metal model, and a robot.

Congratulations to the more than 300 students who participated and to the 98 students whose project made it to the finals on April 22-24.

These projects were carefully judged by 37 judges (thank you all!), and the top prizes went to:

- 1<sup>st</sup> place - Angela Perez, Vista Middle School, "**Leaf it to Robots!**"
- 2<sup>nd</sup> place - Kira Hammond, J. Paul Taylor Academy, "**A Beaded Desert**"
- 3<sup>rd</sup> place - Maliyah Richardson and Gaby Torres, Sierra Middle School, "**Rabbits in Action**"

# A Home for Pollinators

at Asombro's **CHIHUAHUAN DESERT NATURE PARK**

Exciting additions are taking flight at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park, all thanks to the hard work of two exceptional young conservationists!

Local Boy Scouts, Wesley Bartoszek from Troop 173 and Ryan Schrader from Troop 68, were working to achieve scouting's highest rank of Eagle Scout. They each contributed projects to enhance the Nature Park's biodiversity and attract more pollinators for our native flora.

Wesley built and installed three bat nursery boxes. Using guidance from Bat Conservation International, the boxes are crafted to provide a secure and comfortable environment for bats to raise their offspring. This will encourage bats to spend more time at the Nature Park, pollinating nocturnal flowers and naturally controlling insect populations.

Ryan focused his efforts on beneficial insects, particularly solitary bees and wasps. Unlike their social cousins, these insects often nest in tunnels in the ground or within plant material. Ryan built and installed pollinator boxes, which use simple materials like pinecones, bamboo sticks, and paper straws that insects can use as refuges or nesting sites. The pollinator boxes expand the habitat available for these essential pollinators.

These wonderful additions, spearheaded by the initiative of young leaders, underscore the power of community science and conservation.

Please come visit the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park and enjoy the buzz around these new additions to our park.

Asombro invites you to spread your wings and celebrate the wonder of butterflies at the annual **Butterfly Flutterby!** This family-friendly celebration will take place on **Saturday, May 17, from 9 AM to noon** at Asombro's outdoor classroom, the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park (56501 N. Jornada Road, Las Cruces).

The Butterfly Flutterby offers a variety of engaging activity stations designed to delight and educate visitors of all ages:

- Interactive displays and presentations by butterfly experts
- Creative arts and crafts activities
- Results from the New Mexico Butterfly Monitoring Network's recent surveys at the Nature Park
- Fun butterfly-themed games
- Valuable information on butterfly conservation
- Attendees can also collect four free trading cards featuring local butterfly species to take home!

"Learning about our local butterflies and how we can protect them is more important than ever," said Asombro's Executive Director, Stephanie Bestelmeyer. "A recent study published in Science found that butterfly populations declined by 22% between 2000 and 2020.

Butterfly Flutterby participants will learn how Asombro monitors butterfly populations at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park and how restoring native landscapes — even in small spaces like backyards — can provide vital support for these beautiful and essential pollinators.

## New Asombro Program Extends Field Trip Learning to the Schoolyard

Each year, more than 1,200 students attend field trips hosted by Asombro. These full-day trips expose students to the wonder of the natural world through nature walks and hands-on activity stations that focus on local, current ecological research.

Our dream has been to extend this learning after the field trip is over and help students recognize nature that surrounds their schools and homes too.

Thanks to a grant to Asombro from the New Mexico Outdoor Recreation Division's **Outdoor Equity Fund**, our dream is becoming a reality this spring!

More than 60 classes of 2nd-5th grade students will receive a packet of post-field trip activities that can be done in the schoolyard. Each class will also receive a tote bag with a class set of materials to complete all the activities.

The new activities are a mixture of science, math, and language arts, helping elementary teachers cover multiple subjects. And the activities extend the research themes covered on the field trip - erosion for 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> grades and conservation research for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grades.
