The Asombro Institute for Science Education held a BioBlitz at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park on Saturday, September 19. This BioBlitz was a 15-hour event in which teams of volunteer scientists, families, students, teachers, and

other community
members worked
together to find and
identify plants and
animals. We also
included rocks and soils.
While we know rocks
and soils are not "bio,"
we have so many
interesting geologic
features at the Nature
Park, we just had to
include them!

We had three primary objectives for the event:

1) Bring attention to the diversity of plants and animals in the Chihuahuan Desert.

- 2) Give the public an opportunity to work with and learn from local experts.
- 3) Start a species inventory list at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park.

During the BioBlitz, 30 local scientists worked with other project participants to record a total of 201 species of plants and animals and three rock types. While we know this is just a small fraction of the total

diversity within the Park, this is a great start considering the uncharacteristically cool, wet, and cloudy weather that day.

Many people braved the elements to participate in the BioBlitz. In addition to surveys, visitors learned about desert soil, food webs, small mammals, animals that live in the playa, bear ecology, animal senses, bat echolocation, and reptile diversity through short educational presentations that took place through the day.


using nature to teach science concepts. When he is not working, Ryan can be found reading, birding, fishing, or hiking with his dog.
